## Incident Narrative 11-001182 1

On December 2, 2011, I, Deputy Bell, was on duty and working in the patrol division of the Grand County Sheriff's Office in Grand County, Colorado. At about 1725 hours, I arrived at 124 Ridgeway, Hot Sulphur Springs, Colorado, to take a report of a stolen firearm.

I met with Baumgardner, Randy DOB: 04/30/1956, who reported to me that sometime in November 2011, someone had taken a handgun from a closet in the downstairs of his residence. He stated he had last seen the gun in early November and noticed it was missing in the last week of November. He described the gun as a 30+ year old High Standard, .22LR, 9 shot revolver. He stated it was nickel plated with imitation pearl handle grips. He stated one of the grips had a crack in it and the barrel, 6 inches in length, had a heat stain on it. He estimated the value of the gun to be approximately \$400 and he could not provide the serial number for the firearm.

Baumgardner stated he suspected his stepson, Gramm, Michael DOB: 12/14/1988, may have taken the gun, but he stated his wife had already called Gramm and he stated he did not have it. Baumgardner showed me the location where he kept the gun. The gun was kept on a shelf in a closet, in plain view, in a utility type room in the lower level of his home. It seemed unlikely that a burglar would have taken only the one firearm and left the rest of the home undisturbed. It seemed more likely that whom ever took the gun knew of its location prior to taking it.

Baumgardner stated that Gramm had recently gone to Texas to work with his father for awhile. He asked, for the sake of his relationship with his wife, that we not confront Gramm about the firearm unless we had strong evidence against him first. He hinted that the gun was not worth the conflict it may cause in his family in trying to get it back. Baumgardner asked that I document the fact that the firearm is no longer in his possession and if it is ever recovered, he would appreciate its return.
